Title Revocation Affidavit for Incorrect Manufacturer's Certificate of Origin Surrendered

Information

This form may only be used to revoke the title application for a vehicle when the incorrect manufacturer's certificate of origin (MCO) was surrendered by a licensed franchise dealer resulting in the wrong vehicle being titled.

Typically, a Texas title issues on the 7th calendar day following county processing. If the Texas Certificate of Title is issued prior to the department receiving and/or processing this affidavit, the dealer will be responsible for obtaining and submitting the original Texas Certificate of Title before the record will be revoked. However, if the Texas title is an electronic title held by a lienholder, the lienholder is not required to release the title to the dealer.

If the Texas Certificate of Title is lost or stolen, the dealer may certify the title was lost or stolen in the "Dealer Affidavit" section.

Instructions

Please complete this form in black or blue ink only.

- 1. The dealer will complete the "Vehicle Information," and "Dealer Information" sections. Additionally, the "Lienholder Information" section will also be completed if there is a lienholder.
- 2. The dealer will provide evidence any recorded lien has been released or any recorded lienholder has no interest in the vehicle.
 - A separate form may be used if there are multiple lienholders.
- 3. Once the dealer has obtained evidence the lienholder has released its interest in the vehicle, as applicable, the dealer will complete the "Dealer Affidavit" before a notary public. **If multiple forms are used, each form must contain an original dealer affidavit and notary.** Once the form(s) have been notarized, the dealer will submit the following to the Texas Department of Motor Vehicles:
 - Original, notarized *Title Revocation Affidavit for Incorrect Manufacturer's Certificate of Origin Surrendered* (Form VTR-18)
 - Release of lien or letter of no interest, if the "Lienholder Acknowledgement" is not signed by the lienholder(s)
 - The original Texas Certificate of Title (if the Texas Certificate of Title has already been issued)*
- * If the original Texas Certificate of Title is lost or stolen, the dealer may certify this in the "Dealer Affidavit" section.

5. An MCO that is surrendered to the county tax assessor-collector's office cannot be returned. The dealer will need to obtain a duplicate MCO to facilitate a subsequent transfer.
